<p>Olympic Games – Special Restrictions (May – October 2008)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • There will be an X-ray security inspection on sea shipments. • For non-diplomatic FSL Shipments it is advised to send the containers to POE Beijing directly via Through Bill of Landing. • All air shipments to Beijing will be inspected during customs clearance • An Original Bill of Lading with all supporting documents must now be lodged for Beijing. Copies of the OBL will no longer be accepted. • Shipments dispatched with Telex Release must now wait for the shipment to actually arrive into port and then the original delivery order is required from the shipping line in order to proceed with registering with customs for the import permit. This will delay any Telex Release shipment by an extra 3-5 days, incurring demurrage and port storage charges that will be passed on to either the client or booking agent. 	<p><u>Shanghai Changes:</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All shipments to China via the Port of Entry Shanghai for both air and sea shipments will undergo an inspection. This will be for all shipments regardless of size • All HHG and PE shipments, air and sea, from all countries -particularly Germany and France - will undergo 100% inspections. It is expected that this will cause moderate to severe delays in the clearance times for both air and sea shipments. • This policy also affects all exports of HHGs & PE shipments going to France and Germany. • For Export Shipments through the ports of Shanghai, customs authorities have implemented a very strict policy regarding the inclusion of pirated DVDs and CDs in any HHG & PE shipments. If pirated DVDs or CDs are found during an inspection, customs will confiscate those items and fine the client as well. • Do not pack any rice, milk and/or meat products, oil & liquor products and maps in any air shipments 	<p><u>Beijing Changes</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • All shipments face 100% quarantine inspections and will incur additional fees as a result. • Customs declarations must be submitted within 2 days of shipments arrival. • For clients holding work and resident permits valid for 1 year or more, may apply for import permit for both the air and the sea shipment at the same time. For work and resident permits that are less than a full year (365 days) then the following will apply: If between 355-364 days – an explanation letter to customs will need to be prepared. If between 335-354 days - Customs will require a deposit. If less than 335 days – Either full duty or a deposit, subject to approval and agreement from customs. Where a deposit is taken, this is refunded after papers are submitted valid for a minimum of 365 days. • Traffic restrictions in the Beijing area will affect shipment delivery. • The Xingang customs office will require the use of a designated trucking company to transfer the shipment within the port area, and the contracted trucking company can pickup the shipment only once customs clearance is completed and the container is sealed.

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<p>Removal goods - personnel of foreign representative office, joint venture, wholly owned company</p>	<p>Import Permit ("Customs Sealed Letter") is required for customs clearance.</p> <p>Documents required for Import Permit are as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Chinese Residency Card (Green Card) • Passport with Z visa • Employment Card • Company's Customs Registration Book • Representative Card (required for foreign representative office) • Company's Business License (required for Joint Venture or wholly owned company) • Application Form with client's signature and company's chop • Inventory packing list for all incoming shipments • 'Baggage Declaration Form' Two copies need to be completed identically and handed to the Customs officials to get stamped. The form returned to the shipper should be forwarded to his destination agent for clearance of his goods. <p>Note: For exit through the Green Channel, the card will simply be collected. To obtain the Baggage Declaration Form with customs chop, exit should be through the Red Channel!</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Application for Employment Card and the Chinese Residency Card are issued within approx. 3-4 weeks after arrival to China. • AFTER issuance of the Residency Card, the expatriate applies for import permit of his/her personal effects/household goods to the local customs bureau.. • ANYTHING listed and approved in the application may be imported within the next 6 months only. • All shipments are subject to inspection by local Customs. • Effective from 1st January 1995, all electrical appliances, furniture, lighting fixtures, foodstuffs, bedding, wine/alcohol included in shipments of household & personal effects will be subject to import duty. • All electrical items must be clearly indicated on the inventory with its model, serial number & size (if applicable). • All video tapes/CD's must be clearly indicated on the inventory. Such items will be subject to an estimated 2-3 weeks inspection by Customs Bureau. Any items containing pornographic and subversive material will be confiscated and a fine may be levied on the owner. • Asian/Chinese antiques must be indicated on the inventory with a separate demand to local Customs to register them for re-export. There is no guarantee that such items will be allowed out of the country. • Fax machines, photocopy machines are NOT ALLOWED in personal shipments. 	<p>This category applies to expatriates employed by and working for foreign representative office, joint venture, or wholly owned company REGISTERED in the city where they will reside in China. Also, it is assumed they will be resident in China for at least three months.</p> <p>Note that customs officers are given broad discretion, and actual procedures may vary from city to city.</p> <p>Contact your agent for current advice.</p> <p>Effective September 2001, Customs in Shanghai require an original passport to be provided during the Customs inspection for all outbound sea shipments belonging to non-Chinese residents.</p> <p>The 'Baggage Declaration Form' is required by some cities only. For more details, please check with your agents in the area.</p>

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<p>Visas</p>	<p>China has temporarily stopped issuing Multiple Journey/Entry Visas to all foreigners. The maximum duration of stay for business visa holders and for tourist visa holders has also been reduced to 1 month, from 90 days and 60 days respectively. This is expected to continue until after the Olympic Games.</p>		
<p>Removal goods - Personnel from News Agency.</p>	<p>Import Permit is required for customs clearance.</p> <p>Documents required for Import Permit is as follows :</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Chinese Residency Card (Green Card) • Passport with J visa • Journalist Card • News Agency Certificate • Customs Registration Book • Customs Application Form with client's signature and News Agency chop • Inventory packing list for all incoming shipments 	<p>Customs regulation is same as foreign enterprise expatriate.</p>	<p>For Shanghai: For air shipments whose owner holds Z visa (employment/work visa): An import permit is mandatory. To apply for the import permit, the original passport (with residence permit) and original work permit are required to present to Shanghai customs. Shanghai customs will hold the original documents from the shipper for about 2-3 working days.</p> <p>For air shipments whose owner holds F visa (business visa) or L visa (travel visa): The passport copies (with passport photo page, latest entry stamp page within the recent 6 months and visa page) would be enough for the clearance purpose. But the shipment cannot exceed 350 Kgs Gross.</p>
<p>Removal goods - Returning Chinese</p>	<p>No need to apply for Import Permit. The original passport is required by the customs. It will take about 3-4 working days for clearance purpose.</p>	<p>Customs regulation is same as foreign enterprise.</p>	<p>In some cities there is a weight allowance limitation on returning Chinese's household goods importation. Please check with your destination agent for further information.</p>
<p>Please note the following regarding shipments to China for returning Chinese Nationals POE SHANGHAI. This is applicable for returning Chinese nationals without proof of foreign residency (e.g. Green Cards). If following items are included in a sea shipment, additional explanation letters and special approval from Senior customs official needs to be obtained:</p>			

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Books	<p>Documentation that we would need to provide, to support the appeal to customs:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Original Chinese Passport • Original -completed Baggage Declaration Form and stamped by customs upon entry (This is a MUST for returning Chinese) 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - anything over 10 pcs will be dutiable, and an explanation letter is required. -The explanation letter needs to be as detailed as possible, stating where the books were purchased (China or abroad), how many pcs, and what titles. If books are related to work / study. Novels and entertaining literature would cause problems. - should not be more than 50 books. 	
CD-DVD	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Business License (Copy with Company Chop) - if not available, we might need to issue an explanation letter on why not... 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - should not be more than 20 pcs altogether - explanation letter has to be issued, stating on where the discs were purchased, and what titles.

Documents required for Import Permit is as follows:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Diplomatic Card • Passport • Original AWB/or OBL with embassy's chop • Shipment arrival notice from local shipping agent (refer to sea shipment) • Inventory packing list with embassy's chop • Application form with authorised signature from Embassy and embassy's chop. • I/P has to be applied by Embassy. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • No customs inspection on diplomatic shipment. • No duty on diplomatic shipment.

Vietnam</p>	<p>Customs duties/taxes are currently based on 10% of the declared value (maybe USD0.70 per chargeable kilo at some airports) subject to customs discretion. Customs reserve the right to levy higher duties/taxes on what is deemed as commercial quantities.</p> <p>Food items invite inspection by customs / quarantine division and may delay the clearance.</p> <p>Undesirable items will be confiscated / destroyed without any explanation or refund.</p> <p>Entire shipment may be placed into quarantine inside the customs bonded warehouse for an indefinite period.</p> <p>Additional charges incurred for the quarantine, trucking etc., may amount up to USD500.00 depending on the period and the size of the shipment.</p>

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Computers			PC's with encryption capabilities require approval of software prior to importation. Import of normal PC's and laptops with simple password software for e-mail, windows, Microsoft outlook, etc. as part of a HHG shipment would however not be a problem. Please contact your agent for more details.

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<p>Fumigation of imported wood packaging material</p>		<p>Effective January 2006, The General Administration of Quality Supervision, Inspection and Quarantine of the People China requires that wooden packaging material imported into China be either heat treated or fumigated with methyl bromide and properly marked .</p> <p>The new measure follows ISPM-15 (International standards for Phytosanitary Measures Publication 15) Guidelines for Regulating Wood Packaging Material in International Trade (aka NIFM-15) to standardise the treatment of wood packing materials used for the transport of goods.</p> <p>The wood packing material must be marked in a visible location on each article, on at least two opposite sides of the article with a legible and permanent mark in black ink. Labels and adhesives are not allowed. Manufactured wood materials such as plywood, particleboard, oriented strand board and fibreboard. 2. 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Dutiable Items		Starting from Jan. 1, 07, shipper needs to pay 30% of customs duty on his golf clubs if he/she importing golf clubs in his or her household goods shipment to China. Estimated customs duty amount is USD230/set	
Antiques	<p><u>Private Export of Relics earlier than 1911 will not be Allowed Outside of China</u></p> <p>The 60th reigning year of the Qianlong Emperor in the Qing Dynasty, or 1795 was the previous standard for relics being exported from China. All relics made or produced before that year were and still are prohibited from being exported. However, this standard has been changed to 1911. "1911" will replace "1795" as the new time standard for relics being exported out of China.</p> <p>Furthermore, for those important relics, the year limit is set to 1949; and for important relics and fine arts by the ethnic minorities, the limit is 1966.</p> <p>Relics restricted in this revised regulation will include porcelain ware, gold ware, silverware, copperware and some other metal wares; jade ware, lacquer ware, glassware, carvings and sculptures of all materials; furniture, handwritings, calligraphies and paintings, rubbings, books, documentations, weaves and embroideries, cultural equipment, postage stamps, currencies, appliances, handicrafts and fine arts, etc.</p> <p>Any customers wishing to import in to China items of Chinese origin that could fall under the new regulations, must register them with the authorities prior to customs release. Anyone not doing so may have great difficulty in later re-exporting these items when they leave China.</p>
